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INTRODUCTION FROM THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES & CEO



Figures show that in 2024, no country has achieved gender equality.

One in three countries have made no progress since 2015, and the situation of women has deteriorated in 18 countries.

These are stark statistics, especially against the backdrop of the Sustainable Development Goal to achieve gender equality by 2030. A commitment by the world that is way off track.

In response to these challenges, The Circle has redoubled its efforts to tackle some of the biggest barriers to change.

The data shows that countries with stronger feminist movements cultivate more robust policies on violence against women than those that don't. This is thanks to the ceaseless advocacy of women's rights organisations, despite their woeful lack of funding. The Circle are proud to have increased our funding this year to women-led grassroot organisations around the world tackling gender-based violence and increasing economic empowerment.

And there's more. The Circle's advocacy work has also directly helped to shape new EU due diligence legislation explicitly including a living wage as a human right.

The challenges we face are huge, yet with the power and energy of our global network, we are tackling them head on. Thank you for playing a vital role in improving the lives of women and girls.

In response to global crises impacting women, we donated additional funds to our partners on the frontlines. This included Root of Generations working with Sudanese refugees fleeing across the border and Marie Colvin Journalist Network supporting local women journalists in Gaza.

37% NETWORK GROWTH IN 12 MONTHS



We grew our global feminist network by 37% in twelve months and developed partnerships with the likes of TikTok, L'Oreal Fund for Women, Universal Music Group, Sony Music UK and Warner Music Group.

Set against a background of global economic turmoil and a widespread rollback of rights for women,

we stood firm with our 2022-25 strategic aims, almost doubling the number of partners we support and increasing our funding and support to these grassroots organisations. We invested in our gamechanging advocacy work and defined our vital advocacy goals for the future.

We brought our global partners together to share their expertise through our Partners Circle, and we amplified their voices in our targeted campaigns.

To support us as we grow, we invested in technology, people and systems to ensure we stay connected and ready for the future.

FUND & SUPPORT

You have enabled us to invest in grassroot partner organisations that share our vision to provide economic empowerment and to end violence for the most vulnerable women and girls across the world.

The Circle's partnership provides a unique mix of flexible funding and non-financial capacity building support through our global network. This includes legal advice, workshops and amplification across our channels and as part of our events calendar, allowing organisations to grow and become sustainable. In 2023-24, we funded and supported 12 frontline organisations - seven are established partnerships and five began this year. We are energised to share in this report the immense impact achieved, which overall in reach sees a 22-fold increase from last year to 88,000+ women.

SUSTAINABLE 8 PROGRESSIVE



The Circle has continued to strive forward as a progressive organisation, ensuring we are inclusive and diverse, bringing together locally-led partners and influencing global change. We are delighted to have increased our geographic spread of partners, diversified our board and team, and worked with high profile women to utilise their platforms and amplify frontline partners.

The charity sector has, however, this past year faced considerable challenges due to the economic climate. We have not been immune to this at The Circle, but we have worked diligently in partnership with our supporters and donors to find ways to generate much needed funds and partnerships to ensure future success. We have developed excellent relationships with philanthropy funds and networks, harnessing the power of collective giving and vision. Crucially, this past year, we have focused on making our funding more sustainable through our Empowerment Fund. It is comprised of dedicated donors that share our commitment to unrestricted multi-year donations as the key to creating lasting change.

Thanks to our donors' commitment to unrestricted multi-year funding, we were able to give flexibly as demands for services changed due to world events. As the crises in Gaza and Sudan unfolded, we were able to respond with agility to the needs of women and girls.



The Circle's advocacy goal – of collective action from a strong, global feminist movement that ensures women and girls enjoy a safe, secure and dignified life – was brought to life this year.

The Circle has been advocating for legislation to force fashion companies to pay a living wage in their supply chains for many years. A particular win has been the explicit inclusion of living wages as a human right within the EU's ground-breaking Corporate Due Diligence Directive, and direct feedback that our advocacy efforts had helped shape the social content of this important legislation. Work has now begun to build on this success at the EU level and also to push for similar legislation in the UK. As part of our efforts to contribute to a strong, dynamic global feminist movement, we have joined global efforts to make 'gender apartheid' an international crime and used our voice to join calls for a ceasefire in Gaza. We have supported our partner organisations in their advocacy efforts and created the #MakeAStandFor1in3 campaign to call on the UK government to increase its overseas aid to tackle gender-based violence and increase funding to grassroots women's rights organisations.

Work has also begun on an exciting new area of improving access to justice for survivors of sexual violence. Watch this space.

International Women's Day

Despite the staggering statistics – with one in three women globally experiencing violence in their lifetime – funding for women's rights and gender-based violence initiatives remains critically low.

Annie Lennox spearheaded our #MakeAStandfor1in3 campaign, urging more funding for organisations combatting gender-based violence. Our demands featured in over 20 media outlets, including Vogue, Good Morning Britain and Sky News.

High-profile supporters such as Brandi Carlile, Mary Robinson and Sam Taylor-Johnson joined our grassroots partners to create a striking photo campaign, showing solidarity with the one in three women facing violence worldwide.

16 Days of Activism

With support from our partner TikTok, our 16 Days of Activism against Gender-Based Violence social media campaign reached over 20 million views globally. It highlighted the shocking prevalence of gender-based violence and offered practical tips on how everyone can help end violence against women and girls.

Green Carpet Fashion Awards

We were delighted that The Circle ambassador Kalpona Akter was awarded The Messenger Award at the Green Carpet Fashion Awards in Los Angeles, California for her lifelong work fighting for worker safety, fair wages and the right to labour unions. The Circle was honoured to be the charity partner at the event co-chaired by Livia Firth, Zendaya, Helen Hunt, Julianne Moore and others.

CONNECT & CONVENE

The Circle celebrated 15 years of impact alongside global feminist leaders.

We were delighted to host a powerhouse of global feminist leaders in celebration of our 15th anniversary at The Conduit, London. Our panel included former Prime Minister of Australia, Julia Gillard, TIME Woman of the Year, Zahra Joya, and Cianne Jones, CEO of Women in Leadership. Hosted by journalist and ambassador Lucy Siegle, the panel discussed the state of the world for women, in front of a packed house.



Marking Women's History Month and International Women's Day, women from across the music industry convened to create change.



In an important demonstration of solidarity and action, a group of leading women within the UK music industry joined The Circle at House of Koko, London to raise money for women and girls facing unspeakable challenges. We were delighted to welcome female leaders from Sony Music UK, Universal Music, Tan Ward, FUGA, Amazon, Island Records, MFN, RCA, Warner Music, MCPR, Deviate Digital, Virgin Music and more.

Hosted by Deborah Francis-White of The Guilty Feminist podcast, the sold-out event featured an engaging discussion with Rwandan activist, Delphine Uwamahoro, and we would particularly like to thank our organising committee who helped raise over £60,000.

We connected women across the world through our Global Feminism Series

Countless supporters watched our webinar featuring Annie Lennox in conversation with former president of Ireland, Mary Robinson, on International Women's Day live from Los Angeles. We also hosted our first ever live event from Uganda, featuring women's rights leader Grace Lwanga and our partner Women in Leadership, Uganda.

Our funded grassroots partners were brought together in their first Partners Circle

...enabling them to feel more connected in their work, share challenges, ways of working and visions for the future. Partners from Rwanda and DRC went on to conduct a peer support meeting to share skills, resources and identify potential areas of collaboration and support. Others created new initiatives for the 16 Days of Activism inspired by each other's work. "This exchange of knowledge can help the Women's Centre learn from others' best practices and apply them to their programs, enhancing their impact."

HIGHLIGHTS FROM OUR GRASSROOT PARTNERS

MKAAJI

NEW PARTNER

In the Democratic Republic of Congo we support women with a new partner, MKAAJI

MKAAJI is combatting sexual and gender-based violence (GBV) around mining sites in the Democratic Republic of Congo, amplifying women's voices and keeping them safer in their communities.

In partnership with The Circle, they support and empower survivors, providing income generating opportunities and training in community conflict resolution, which includes establishing two leadership and dialogue centres. In this first year, 100 women have been directly positively impacted and 800 indirectly.

OUR SISTERS' OPPORTUNITY



In Rwanda our new partner Our Sisters' Opportunity (OSO) are driving social change

Our Sisters' Opportunity provides education and economic empowerment for women, driving social change in Rwanda where 76% of the female population are subjected to poor pay and working conditions and discrimination.

In the first year of our partnership, with our funding support, OSO provided training, peer support, networking opportunities and advocacy to over 500 survivors of GBV, helping them support their families and enhance their livelihoods.

Over 95% of OSO's graduates have gone on to start their own business.



"To be in The Circle's global network means a lot. Sometimes we think that we are alone, feeling really lonely in this journey. WEBFALA DIGITAL EDUCATION FOR ALL



We are supporting for the first time, Webfala in Nigeria in their work to support survivors of violence into employment

Nigeria is Africa's most populous country and one of the continent's largest economies, yet many Nigerians still navigate a complex economic landscape.

Webfala provides skills in STEM education and digital literacy to give women more long-term employability and bring about social change. Last year, in partnership with The Circle, Webfala supported around 150 survivors of gender-based violence directly, and around 600 indirectly, with training, internships and professional networking opportunities.



WOMEN'S EMPOWERMENT ALLIANCE



In South Sudan – Women's Empowerment Alliance (WEA) 75% of students are in employment just four months after graduation.

Webfala Founder, Bakare Opeyemi Nafisat, says: "The benefit of being part of The Circle is that our visibility grows and thus we can attract funding and other support to continue to advance feminism and women's rights issues."

The WEA is empowering women through livelihood programmes, health education and women's rights advocacy in a bid to combat chronic unemployment and sexual violence.

In South Sudan, over 90% of women suffer poor working conditions and infringement of their employment rights.

WEA's partnership with The Circle economically empowers women who have faced significant challenges and disadvantages, including discontinued education, single motherhood, gender-based violence and widowhood.

Last year, The Circle's funding supported professional driving training and employment opportunities for 40 of the most vulnerable women, which has led to employment opportunities as professional drivers with international organisations, giving them and their families a stable income they otherwise wouldn't have received.

ROOT OF GENERATIONS



Supporting women in South Sudan

A decade after independence, South Sudan is still suffering instability and economic hardship with 95% of women subjected to inadequate earnings, poor work conditions and an infringement of their rights.

Thanks to funding via our new partnership, Root of Generations has trained 100 women and girls in business skills and helped them with start-up funds for businesses. Root of Generations reached a further 3,000 women through other initiatives and led a campaign on protection, resulting in training for 70 community police to keep women safer.

The Circle also provided Root of Generations with a crisis grant to enable them to respond to the needs of Sudanese women fleeing the conflict from South Sudan's now neighbouring country, seeking safety in displacement camps in Juba. Root of Generations consulted with women in the camps and, following an in-depth assessment, designed a tailored support programme for over 40 women and will continue to increase their support to this crisis.

Founder Grace knows only too well the pain and harsh reality of what it is like to run from violence:

"I was displaced as a child in South Sudan's war and ended up in a refugee camp in Kenya alone when I was between five and seven years old. Women and children are especially at risk in times of conflict. The desperation and violence women are facing including to their children is beyond imagining." Stand up for the Rights of Women

AWER WOMEN'S EMPOWERMENT

In Kenya, women are being supported by AWER Women's Empowerment

Alice was kidnapped and trafficked to Somalia by an Islamist militant group that forced her into sex slavery and hard labour. She is from an area in Kenya that has been a frequent target for community raids, and if a stolen woman or girl manages to escape, her ordeal doesn't end there. Often ostracised by their community, survivors can find it almost impossible to reintegrate into society.

Motivated to ensure other survivors receive the support they need to rebuild their lives, Alice cofounded Awer Women's Empowerment, a lifeline for those fleeing conflict.

AWER advocates for the rights of indigenous women and to eradicate GBV by providing psychosocial and medical care, legal support, housing assistance and vocational training.

In partnership with The Circle, AWER is further empowering women through training to be advocates in their communities.

Alice says, "When we know our rights, we can always fight against those who are trying to violate our rights."

PRESS

MARIE COLVIN Journalists' Network

In the Middle East and North Africa, women journalists working in the toughest of circumstances are supported by the Marie Colvin Journalists' Network (MCJN)

Marie Colvin Journalists' Network supports, empowers and connects women journalists across the Arab region working in some of the most challenging environments in the Middle East and North Africa.

Providing bespoke mentoring, training opportunities, individual trauma counselling and crisis support to local, often freelance, journalists, MCJN ensures the journalists are able to remain in the industry, telling the stories of their communities.

Founded by friends of the fearless journalist following her death in 2012, MCJN began life within The Circle, becoming an independent organisation in 2022. We have continued investing in our partnership, and are incredibly proud of MCJN directly supporting 130 women during 2023 to 2024, and indirectly benefiting thousands more across 15 countries. With emergency funding from The Circle, MCJN was able to respond to the crisis in Gaza by providing support, counselling and financial aid to women journalists working in the toughest of conditions.

NONCEBA FAMILY COUNSELLING CENTRE

In South Africa, we work with Nonceba Family Counselling Centre

"I am now surrounded by women who I love spending time with. They advise me and help me think about what to do with my life. I feel safe for the first time after the abuse I experienced at the hands of the father of my children." Anon Nonceba service user

Nonceba Family Counselling Centre works in the largest township in South Africa's Western Cape province, which has high levels of poverty, unemployment and crime.

Nonceba is a lifeline for women fleeing abuse, violence and homelessness, providing a refuge, access to counselling, peer support and the skills and confidence that they can live an independent life.

In the last year, in partnership with The Circle, Nonceba has directly supported over 200 women and girls fleeing violence with safe shelter, psychosocial and therapeutic support. A further 100 women have received skills development, such as sewing, enabling them to start businesses so they can provide for their family needs.

Our partnership has also provided vital networking opportunities for Nonceba and access to high level platforms, further amplifying its voice on the issue of domestic violence. South Africa has one of the highest rape statistics in the world, even higher than some countries at war.



RAHELA TRUST

Rahela Trust is Afghan led, embedded in the Afghan diaspora in the UK

Rahela Trust supports women in rural Afghanistan via a global network of Afghan women.

The Diaspora Changemaker project, receiving funding from The Circle, provides mentoring, tools and scholarships to support the educational and professional development of women and girls.

Currently facing gender apartheid, such as being barred from education and employment opportunities, the network aims to bolster leadership and professional development for talented women in rural Afghanistan. It also influences the international community to support educational opportunities for Afghanistan's female population.



Last year, Rahela Trust's partnership with The Circle provided Afghan girls with financial assistance and study materials enabling them to become leaders and agents of change in their own communities.

SIKH WOMEN'S AID

A pioneering voice in supporting and empowering vulnerable women from Sikh and South-Asian backgrounds in the UK

Working with women who have suffered domestic abuse and tackling the cultural influences that exploit women and girls, Sikh Women's Aid offer crisis intervention, training and workshops on awareness and resilience building. They also advocate for changes to policy at local, regional and national level.

Seven in 10 women from South Asian communities in the UK have experienced abuse, two thirds of them suffer in silence.



Last year, our partnership with Sikh Women's Aid supported 50 women directly and over 100 indirectly.



THE WOMEN'S CENTRE SRI LANKA

The Women's Centre empowers women working in Sri Lanka's garment industry

With Sri Lanka in the midst of an economic crisis, proposed new labour laws that will further negatively impact female workers, and 96% of the workforce still unwilling to join trade unions for fear of repercussions, there are many challenges to be faced.

However, The Women's Centre (TWC) says its partnership with The Circle is already changing individual lives and, longer-term, hopes it will lead to improved policy and social change.

The Women's Centre empowers women working in Sri Lanka's garment industry to stand against widespread oppression, gender-based violence (GBV) and poor working conditions.

Linking with The Circle's work advocating for a living wage for garment workers, The Women's Centre has also played a powerful role on this issue in Sri Lanka and have been elected to the Governance Board of the Clean Clothes Campaign, South Asia Coalition. This appointment attests to their enduring commitment towards advocating for women's rights and social justice, particularly within the realm of fair labour practices. "Linking with the global feminist network through The Circle has helped us connect with others nationally and internationally, amplifying our voices and enabling us to advocate more effectively for policy changes and reforms." Last year, in partnership with The Circle, The Women's Centre reached over 500 women directly and supported 300 more. One method is through camps offering support and awareness of GBV and art therapy workshops for survivors. Padmini Weerasuriya, Executive Director at TWC says, "One female garment worker who attended [an art therapy workshop] told us that she felt heard for the first time and felt she is not alone."



WOMEN IN LEADERSHIP

In Uganda we continued our partnership with Women in Leadership

Women in Leadership (WIL) have been supporting victims of violence in Uganda since 2014 through advocacy and access to vital health services. They amplify the voices of women who have experienced domestic violence and train village health workers to respond, and advocate, for survivors.

Last year, in partnership with The Circle, WIL trained 20 new advocates, directly supported over 150 women in their communities, and reached 1,500 indirectly via a drop-in, a helpline and regular Break the Silence shows on regional radio, resulting in increased confidence amongst survivors in disclosing and reporting domestic violence. Although just a teenager when she married, life for Mama Anita was good until her husband began abusing her and left for another woman. To support her children she ran a baking business, but her husband would return to beat her and destroy work items. Terrified and suicidal, Mama Anita heard about WIL over the radio. WIL Advocate, Catherine, counselled the couple and educated her partner on how his behaviour was both illegal and wrong.

Mama Anita bravely shared her story on the radio to raise awareness and help change attitudes in her community. "My fellow women, I inform you that you shouldn't be quiet. Don't be quiet when violated, it causes others to die. Let them speak up because me personally, I was not as I am now – happy. Let every woman come to WIL and be helped."
